- 1. What subject did Jesus speak about most in his teachings? In what different ways is the kingdom of heaven described by Jesus and the apostles? (See Matthew 4:12,17, 6:10, Luke 17:20-21)
- 2. How do the different descriptions of the kingdom of God seem to contradict each other? Name some scriptures that describe other aspects of the kingdom. (See Matthew 4:23, 18:3, 1 Corinthians 15:22,24)
- 3. How do we make sense of the many ways the kingdom is described in the Bible? What is the first key to understanding apparently contradictory scriptures about the kingdom?
- 4. Who acts as the primary foundation of the kingdom? When did the first phase begin? Who is included in the first phase and what is required of them? (See Luke 17:20-21, John 3:5, Matthew 13:10-11, Mark 10:24-25)
- 5. What does the Bible say about the end of the first phase? What happens to the faithful followers of Jesus? What will their future responsibilities be? (See John 14:1-3, Romans 5:8-9, 1 Peter 2:9,12, Matthew 25:31-33)
- 6. To which group does the second phase of the kingdom apply? Where will this phase of the kingdom be? (See Matthew 6:9-10, 1 John 2:2, 1 Timothy 4:10)
- 7. What has to happen to society and governments before God's kingdom can be set up on earth? Why is this destruction necessary? (See Daniel 2:44, Zephaniah 3:8)
- 8. How is the resurrection described in the Bible and to whom does it apply? What does the word "judgment" mean in John 5:29? (See John 5:28-29)
- 9. How does Jesus' relationship differ between his faithful followers and with the world of mankind? (See 1 Timothy 2:5-6, 1 John 2:1)
- 10. What Bible prophecies illustrate God's plan for His human creation here on earth? (See Zephaniah 3:9, Isaiah 9:6-7, Daniel 7:27, Micah 4:3-4, Revelation 21:4)
- 11. What does the Bible say will happen after the redemptive work of the kingdom is complete? (See 1 Corinthians 15:22-26,28)
