SHOW NOTES

1. Describe how the lives of Adam and Eve were changed by the death sentence given to them as a result of Adam's sin. Who else is under the death penalty caused by Adam's sin? Why? (Genesis 2:15-17, 3:17-19)
2. What does the prophecy of the "seed of the woman" crushing the serpent's head foreshadow? Why is this a glimmer of hope to Adam and Eve (and to us all)? (Genesis 3:15)
3. How do Paul's writings connect the inevitability of death in Adam with the hope of resurrection in Christ? What does this imply about the scope of salvation? (Romans 6:23, 1 Corinthians 15:20-22)
4. How does the Abrahamic promise of blessing "all nations" through Abraham's seed find its fulfillment in Christ? What does this teach us about God's plan for all humanity? (Genesis 22:17-18, Galatians 3:16)
5. Discuss how the angel's proclamation of "good news... for all people" in Luke 2:10-11, and Paul's declaration that "God will have all men to be saved" in 1 Timothy 2:3-6, reinforce the concept of the universality of Jesus' role as Savior.
6. In what way did Jesus' sacrifice "make peace" and allow him "to reconcile all things" to the Father? How does this balance the scales of justice which were out of balance due to Adam's sin? (Colossians 1:19-20, Romans 5:12-19)
7. Explain the two parts of the promise in 1 John 2:1-2. (1 Timothy 2:4, Romans 8:19-21, Psalms 22:27-28)
8. What role do the "sons of God" play in the process of blessing mankind in bringing them back to God? (Romans 5:17-19, 8:19-21)
9. How do the resurrection of judgment and the ministry of reconciliation together illustrate the fairness of God's plan, ensuring all people receive a full opportunity to respond to Christ? (John 5:28-29, Acts 17:30-31, 2 Corinthians 5:17-19)
10. As Jesus truly is the Savior for "all people," how will this shape the way you interact with those of different faiths, backgrounds or even those who reject Christianity?
11. How does knowing you will, as a faithful follower of Jesus, be working with these people to bless them in God's future kingdom, change how you think of them today?
